Brethren,

Just a bit of personal news. My daughter had a baby boy in early September. They named him Mason. Baby and mom are doing well.

We are starting to wind how this Masonic year. In the month of October any changes to the Book of Constitutions (BOC) that you wish to submit are due. The date is October 25. As the officers and I have traveled around the state we have been encouraging the lodges to submit changes they would like to see. Over the past 3 or so years the proposals have for the most part came from a committee. That approach has not worked. It needs to come from the brethren of the lodges who see things in the BOC that are conflicting or that you think need to be addressed to meet the needs of your lodge. You have about 4 weeks to get with the officers of your lodge and send in your proposals so that they can be considered at the Grand Lodge sessions in January.

Speaking of the Grand Lodge sessions, the date is January 23-25. It will be at the Hotel Elegante in Colorado Springs. The office staff and I are busy planning the details of the sessions. For the most part the sessions will be very similar to what we have done in the past. We are making a few tweaks to address schedule problems in the past. My wife is putting together a fun time for the ladies, so she wants me to make sure and tell the brethren to bring their ladies.





We are having a cornerstone in Craig on October 3 at 4:00 PM. This year has been disappointing regarding cornerstones. We only did two cornerstones this year. Because we do cornerstones for public buildings only there may not be as many new projects going on. If you see a school, a city or county building, a library or a state or federal building going up you might want to approach them about the possibility of having the Masons do a cornerstone for the building. We also do churches. It is an opportunity to show our communities that we do exist and are actively supporting our communities. As I have said in the past, there are two pubic ceremonies we do, funerals and cornerstones. We do funerals to honor our brethren who have passed away. Cornerstone are a joyous occasion because it celebrates the industry of our communities.

Also, this year we have had several lodges who have decided to merge and, in some cases, sell the building they meet in. It is sad to see this happen, but it is understandable. Sometimes the

lack of active members makes it difficult to continue to operate a lodge. If you are one of those brothers who does not attend lodge, I would encourage you to try to attend and support your local lodge. If we don't, your lodge may be one of those that looks to merge. We also see lodges unable to meet the expenses of a building and must sell their building. The monthly expenses such as insurance and utilities are more than the lodge takes in annually in dues and investments, and it may be difficult or impossible to rent the building for additional income. Remember that your lodge is the members, not the building. Having talked about the mergers we have going on remember that if your lodge is considering merging or selling their building there are some things that must be done according to the BOC. Work with your District Lecture and Grand Lodge officer to make these transitions go smoothly.

In the next two months I am going to be in several parts of the state visiting lodges who have invited me and giving our awards for long time membership in our beloved fraternity. If there is one going on near you, I encourage you to attend. The brethren love to have other brethren around them when they get honored. They have some really good stories to tell about their time as Masons and It is good to hear what brought them into Masonry and what has kept them involved for so many years.

Masonic Halloween by WB Steven Harrison


Halloween and Freemasonry: There are probably many tie-ins what with all the costumes worn in degree work, skulls and other symbols; and that's before the conspiracy theorists weigh in. Occasionally, though, the pairing of the mysterious holiday and Freemasonry brings to mind images of Harry Houdini, a life member of St. Cecile Lodge 568, New York City.

A man of mystery, you could almost say Brother Harry lived Halloween 24/7. Aside from being, arguably, the world's greatest magician and escape artist, Houdini maintained an abiding interest in the paranormal. He did not, however deceitfully promote it as he felt many did. He despised fraudulent seers and mediums and worked tirelessly to expose their chicanery. He felt everything he couldn't expose as being fake must be real.

He made many attempts to communicate with his mother after she died, but found no evidence of contact. Still, feeling communication with "the other side" was possible, he made a pact with his wife Bessie that the first to die would attempt to contact the other through a coded message. No one knows what the full message was, but part of the pact was that Houdini would open a pair of silver handcuffs they owned. Bessie never received any communication from Houdini after his death, but hundreds of psychics claimed they did.


On Halloween 1936, the 10th anniversary of his death, she held a final séance in which he failed to appear. After that, Bess declared the search over and said she believed he could not come back, "It is finished." Two years later she created a firestorm in the world of spiritualists when, playing herself in the film *Religious Racketeer*, she said she did not believe communication with the dead was possible.

During his life the great Houdini did everything he could to separate the fake aspects of spiritualism from what he thought might be real. Shortly before his death he testified before congress against spiritualists and fortune tellers licensed to practice in Washington, DC. So adamant was he that they were charlatans, the hearing broke out in a shouting match and some of the spectators tried to attack Houdini.





On the other hand, still believing there was something to communication with the spiritual world, he worked with Thomas Edison in an attempt to develop a "delicate psychic detecting instrument." The object of the "ghost machine," as it was called, was to be so sensitive it could detect the presence or touch of an ethereal being from another world. There is no evidence the machine was ever built.



I was standing in a nondescript empty room on the fourth floor of old Grace Hospital in Detroit. The building, once considered progressive and modern, had deteriorated to the point that it would be torn down in a few months. I ran the Information Technology department downstairs and once my group moved out, the wrecking ball would move in. I soaked it all in. Somehow it just didn't seem that special, but shortly several people and the news media — this year including Time Magazine — would gather there as they had done for years on Halloween.

This wasn't just any room. This was the very place where, on October 31, 1926, Brother Harry Houdini died. I took a final look and turned to leave. As I walked away, people filed past me to enter the room for Houdini's last séance.

Houdini, as had been the case on every Halloween in Grace Hospital since he died, did not show up.
