

Understanding The Masonic Cipher

Freemasons like their secrets, but that's probably not a surprise to you. In fact, if it weren't for secrets, I think most of the world wouldn't have much suspicion about what we do in Freemasonry. Those secrets, truths, and mysteries within our craft are what drive good Masons to continue learning, growing, and improving themselves and the communities around them. We call this educational and self-improvement journey "Seeking Light".


Masonic information conveyed across generations of Freemasons was historically transmitted from mouth to ear; the spoken word. It's difficult to gain access to information before its time if it hasn't been written down. There simply weren't books, documents, or written records for many of the earliest years of the Fraternity. If nothing is written down, there's really no need to protect written information from prying eyes. But as with most things, the craft collected larger amounts of information over time, and it became untenable to depend on word of mouth to pass the data along.

If you've done much reading about Masonry you've probably heard the term *Masonic Cipher*. The Masonic Cipher is also called a "pigpen cipher"; believed to be an ancient cipher developed by Hebrew Kabbalists and used by the Knights Templar for their records and communications during the crusades. While there is a rich history of the use of this style of cipher, the use of this cipher by Freemasons is only really evidenced as early as the mid 1700s. In the United States, in the Trinity Cemetery in New York, resides the oldest known tombstone to contain the Masonic Cipher. The symbols on the tombstone also indicate the resident interred there was a Freemason.

There was a published book that describes this style of "grid cipher" as early as 1685, in the book *Cryptographia*, by author Balthasar Friderici. But the first evidenced written use of the cipher by Freemasons was discovered in a French book written in 1745 titled "L'Ordre des Francs-Macon Trahi". This translates to "The Order of Freemasons Betrayed". This doesn't limit the use of the cipher to 1745 and later, necessarily, particularly if it was known to have been used prior, but this is just the earliest evidence we have of its use. We can safely say we have documented evidence this cipher has been in use for at least 338 years.


The actual origins of the cipher are lost to time but we know it was heavily used in the new world, with even George Washington's army found with documentation for using the cipher with a randomized alphabet, to increase its security.

Ciphers are a method for hiding the meaning of information. They're not terribly complex, compared to modern techniques of encryption, but they worked well enough at obscuring information. But the truth of the matter is that these ciphers' primary purpose was likely to provide a means of granting knowledge to the next level higher of degree. When a 1st degree freemason was passed to a 2nd degree, they would have been given the key to decipher text at that next level. Until then, the mason did not have sufficient "light" to see.

Now, just so it's said, ciphers like this are relatively easy to decipher if you know how. In fact, in 1843 Edgar Allen Poe wrote a short story for The Philadelphia Dollar Newspaper, where he won \$100 for *The Gold Bug*. Within The Gold Bug, Poe describes exactly how to break ciphers like the Pigpen cipher. The methodology uses something called "frequency of letters" to guess what each of the symbols in a cipher translate to.


What is the Masonic Cipher? It's a substitution cipher, where a single character or symbol represents one other single letter, regardless of the language. While many ciphers such as the Caesar Cipher rely solely on a letter-to-letter replacement, the pigpen or Masonic Cipher has taken a slightly different approach.


The Masonic cipher key consists of one or both of either a "hash mark" (resembling a tic-tac-toe board) or a Maltese Cross (a giant X).

The letters of the appropriate alphabet are dispersed across the two graphs, in order. Once a single letter sits in each open space, we begin at the next letter in the alphabet, adding a "dot" with the letter, to distinguish it from the other letter in the same space. If we do this with the English alphabet, we end up with something like this:





Let's write a message using this layout, so you can get a better sense of how this works. The symbol we will use for each letter of our message is constructed from the lines of the grid where our letter sits, plus the dot, if required. If I wanted to use the letter "e" in my message, the symbol I would use is a four sided square. If I wanted to use the letter "r", I would use the four-sided square with a dot in it. Let's decipher a message together:



To decipher the message, we look at the grids to find a section that matches. To me it looks like the Tic-Tac-Toe grid, in the center on the right side. Then we determine if there is a dot, which tells us which of the two letters in that grid we should use. In this case, there's no dot and the first letter is an "F".

The second letter is a four-sided square with a dot in it. That looks like it belongs in the Tic-Tac-Toe grid, in the very center. The dot tells us to use the second letter in that space, which is an "R". If we follow this same strategy until we reach the end of the message, what does it say?

And while the methods used for the pigpen cipher are similar, there will be some differences. This is demonstrated on James Leeson's headstone. The grids used are a little different. They didn't use the Maltese Cross grid, only the hash grid. And they have symbols with TWO dots this time, not just one. That means there are three letters in each section of the grid, or three separate grids altogether.



And there is one more catch! Did you know the letter "J" is a relatively modern invention? The letter was created for use in the Italian language in 1524. It had been seen prior to that during Roman times, but only as an alternative to writing the letter "I". It wasn't its own letter. In fact, Jesus' name was pronounced Yeh-soos prior to the introduction of "J". I'm not sure if the author of the message on the headstone didn't use the letter because it wasn't well used at the time, or if they were trying to stump folks. But they didn't use the letter in the grids. Here's the actual key used to make the message. Using what you've learned so far, what's the message on the headstone for James Leeson?

To finish up this education, I want to answer the question I think you already have forming in your mind. "If the grids are different, how can I decipher these messages?". This question brings us back to our friend Edgar Allen Poe. The key to breaking a substitution cipher is knowing which letter occurs most frequently in a language. In the case of English, "e" is the most occurring letter. This means the symbol you see most in a text is likely "e". The 2nd most occurring letter is "t". The third is "n". You can remember this using the phrase **ETNORIAS**. An anagram for this would be "NOTARIES" or "SENORITA". If you can guess a few of the letters, that tells you where in the grid the letters go, and all the other letters should just fall into place.

That's really it for the Masonic Cipher. It's an interesting look at our fraternity's history and how we have obscured information from the eyes of non-brethren or brothers not yet ready for the information. As you can tell, it's not a terribly secure method. The goal was never to keep information super-secret, it was to make the gradual introduction of light into a brother's life impactful and meaningful. It created veils through which brothers could not see clearly. With each transition into the next degree, those veils were removed, and light granted. Those transitions through the degrees, through the knowledge, were given a mystery that made them more meaningful to brothers.
