





From the Desk of the Grand Master

In the heart of our Masonic lodges, amidst the grandeur of our traditions and the solemnity of our rituals, there lies an unspoken challenge that threatens to erode the very foundation upon which our fraternity stands. This challenge is not external but internal, manifesting through despondence and fear. It's a creeping shadow that, left unchecked, gradually diminishes our belief in ourselves and the principles we hold dear.





Our lodges, which should be bastions of tolerance, grace, and mutual support, may unknowingly succumb to the very vices we vow to stand against. Disrespect and intolerance, once repaid in kind, signal a departure from our foundational teachings. The book entitled Running with the Demons by Terry Brooks, speaks to many of the ills plaguing our country, and our fraternity, today. It warns of a society where judgment and division replace understanding and unity: "Men are intolerant and judgmental. They are without grace." It paints a bleak picture of the consequences of abandoning our values, where even the smallest failures in behavior lead to greater lapses in our moral and ethical standards.

Brooks further delves into the stark reality of a community and world at odds with itself, fostering lies that undermine beliefs and committing acts of unfaithfulness, betrayal, and depravity. "Each small darkness breeds another," highlighting how incidents of anger, bitterness, pettiness, and greed multiply, fostering a sense of futility and helplessness against the growing tide of despondence. A world where civilization falls into failure not through one cataclysmic event but through a multitude of small pieces of pettiness.

Yet, it is in acknowledging the source of this madness that we find our path to redemption. The challenge is not merely to recognize the darkness but to confront it, to understand that we are at war with ourselves. The battle is not against external forces but within us, in our hearts and minds.

As members of the Masonic fraternity, we must ask ourselves: Do we believe that life within our lodges, our communities, and our country is better now than it was? Are we contributing to the light or the darkness? The answer lies not in fear or despair but in the courage to face our challenges and the resolve to enact positive change.

In addressing the despondence and fear that may find its way into our lodges, we must return to our foundational principles of brotherly love, relief, and truth. Let us use fear not as a crutch but as a fire to temper our courage and resolve. Let us commit to small acts of kindness and charity, not as signs of weakness but as the strongest expressions of our strength and belief in our principles. Let us foster an environment of tolerance, grace, and mutual support, where every member feels valued and empowered to contribute to the greater good.

In doing so, we not only strengthen the bonds that unite us as Masons but also serve as a beacon of hope and positive change in a world that sorely needs it. Let us embrace the challenge, recognizing that the path to a brighter future for our lodges and society at large begins with each one of us, here and now.



Special Notice from the Most Worshipful Grand Master

The Grand Lodge has become aware that some of our Lodges have come to the attention of Federal and State Internal Revenue Services due to issues with filing or problems in required revenue filings. Consequently, some of our organizations have lost their Not-For-Profit status. To address this, I am initiating efforts to form a team to advise and assist Lodges and Temple boards in restoring their status. My aim is to have a solution or a working team in place within the next 30 days. Several members raised this concern at the Annual Communication, and I am actively gathering the necessary information and personnel to support each of you with this issue. We ask for your patience as we work towards providing you with solutions and tools to overcome these difficulties.

2024 Matching Grants for Lodge Scholarships

Colorado Masons and their lodges have enjoyed great success with the Matching Grant program for many years. Students from all over Colorado have had financial assistance from their local lodges participating in Matching Grants. The Board of the Benevolent Fund sincerely appreciates the support shown by the lodges and is most pleased to continue the Matching Grant program.

The Matching Grants for 2024 will be up to \$500.00. To qualify for the full \$500 match, the Lodge would need to award an educational grant to a 2024 public high school graduating senior who will attend a Colorado institution of higher education. If the Lodge gives a total of \$1,000.00 or more to their chosen student, the match would be for half that amount, or \$500. If a lodge gives less than \$1,000, the match would be for half of the amount of the lodge grant.

One change in the Matching Grant program is that a lodge can give a scholarship to more than one student in their area and apply for a match for each scholarship granted.

The deadline for requesting the matching grant is June 30, 2024. The form should be returned by email to: education@embfa.org, or by snail mail to Scholarship Administrator, PO Box 703, Westminster, CO. If using regular mail, it must be postmarked by June 30, 2024 and received by July 8th. Checks will be distributed to Lodges the end of June or end of July depending on when the request forms are received and logged in.

They Say You Should Never Show Up Empty Handed...

Freemasonry is a unique association. We are brothers in the truest definition of the word. Many other groups use the term "brotherhood" to try to illustrate their connection with one another, but few, if any, embody brotherhood the way freemasons do. To borrow from the postal service, neither place, nor time, nor language, nor creed, nor persuasion shall keep freemasons from the bonds of fellowship. To this end, numerous masonic organizations have created programs to foster relationships between lodges. The Grand Lodge of Colorado has several of these programs, including "Sister Lodges" and the Eastern and Western Traveling Gavel programs. You may be thinking, "We know this. In fact, our lodge is finalizing our plans to S.T.E.A.L. (Strategically Transfer Equipment to Alternative Locations) the Traveling Gavel next week. Why are you talking about stuff we already know?" Well, brothers, the answer is simple. The brethren of Longs Peak Lodge #197 have created another opportunity to foster connections between lodges: a Reverse Traveling Gavel program!

This program is the brainchild of WB William Hutchison, an avid woodworker, who presented it to our lodge on 1 December 2022. The basic concept is that a brother, or a lodge, would travel to another lodge and present the hosting lodge with the gavel. That lodge, or a brother there, would then travel with the gavel to another lodge. The gavel would be handmade by WB Hutchison, carried in a case with a logbook, contact information for Longs Peak Lodge #197 including a QR Code, and links to our website to update the location of the gavel. WB Hutchison's idea was enthusiastically and unanimously approved with no need for discussion. However, before he could think about what he was saying, WB Hutchison added that we did not have to send out only one gavel, we could do as many as we chose; some could even be themed. Before he had a chance to check his words, I quickly asked if there was a motion to expand the program indefinitely. A motion was quickly made, seconded, and unanimously approved. It was at this time WB Hutchison realized the work he created for himself. As of the writing of this article, our traveling gavel program has seen six gavels distributed over three continents with more on the way.

Traveling Gavel 1 (West) – Presented to the Grand Lodge of the Philippines. It is anticipated that this gavel will travel to a lodge in Japan.



Traveling Gavel 2 (South) – Presented to Douglas Lodge #153. WB Dave Tuck has since been able to travel this gavel to Orlando Lodge #69 (Florida), to the Grand Lodge of New York, and Union Lodge #47 in Key West, Florida (southern most lodge in the United States). Currently, Traveling Gavel South is vacationing in South America where it first stopped in Buenos Aires, Argentina before sailing around Cape Horn, stopping in Ushuaia, Argentina (the southern most city in the world), and is heading to Valparaiso, Chile where it plans to leave WB Tuck to continue its journey with brothers from that town.

Traveling Gavel 3 – Presented to Garfield Lodge #50 who then presented it to Fidelity Lodge #19. Fidelity #19 returned the gavel back to Longs Peak Lodge #197. Traveling Gavel 3 was then presented to Denver Lodge #5 by fifteen brothers of Longs Peak Lodge #197 after we secured the Colorado Western Slope Travelling Gavel from them. The brothers of Denver #5 were discussing the possibility of taking it to a lodge in Europe.

Traveling Gavel 4 – Presented to Oasis Lodge #67.

Traveling Gavel 5 – Presented to Jubilee Lodge #746 in Whiteland, IN. It was then presented to Monroe Lodge #22 in Bloomington, IN and was used during a Master Mason degree. It was then traveled to Ellettsville Lodge #245 in Elletsville, IN. After that, it was presented to the Grand Lodge of Ohio during their annual communication. It was then presented to Webb Lodge #24 in Richmond, IN where it was used during their 200th anniversary celebration. Traveling Gavel #5 is

currently being traveled to Greenville Lodge #143 in Greenville, OH.

Traveling Gavel 6 – Presented to Cheyenne Lodge #1 in Cheyenne, Wyoming.

In addition to these gavels, Longs Peak Lodge #197 is planning to travel gavels to lodges in Kansas, Thailand, New Zealand, and at least two lodges to the Washington, D.C. area.

Since its inception, this project has elevated the enthusiasm of the brethren, connected lodges around the world, and created new personal relationships between individual brothers. On behalf of the brethren of Longs Peak Lodge #197, I want to sincerely thank all of you who have participated in our program. This program is truly a global effort, and you each play an important role. As we move forward into the 2024 masonic year and beyond, you should expect

to see more gavels traveling around. In fact, if you are planning a trip and want to take a gavel to a lodge visit, do not hesitate to reach out to me and we can try to provide you with a gavel to present!

Membership Awareness and Retention

Greetings Worshipful Masters, Officers, and Brothers:

As 2024 begins and we look to Freemasonry through the lens of membership, awareness, and retention, I wonder how many of our lodges are actively engaged in membership, awareness, and retention in their lodges and in the local communities?

I would like to hear from the lodge representatives on what they are doing to promote the craft from membership to awareness in their lodges and community at large. What are the various ways that you maintain the members' awareness and interest of the craft? What local programs do you have in place to expand your membership locally?

One program for consideration for 2024 is the creation of a Craft Warden position or appointee and I bet that some of the lodges already have a similar position in place, but I would also like to know if that is the case for those that do and those that do not.

The concept of the Craft Warden would be to address the above membership and awareness activities inside the individual lodges and build an interface between the lodges and membership & awareness and the GL district lecturer. The Craft Warden would be responsible for local membership & awareness activities for your lodge and allowing for a larger base of ideas and exchange of information between the GL committee and the lodges. The position could encompass things like holding and scheduling local training and presentations for your lodge as educational, awareness, retention type material, candidate open houses or even scheduling digital meetings based on approved content and format as an open meeting.

A coordinator for any and all membership and awareness, and retention for the members and prospects for your lodge and local area but focusing on membership and awareness. By nature, the responsibilities of the Craft Warden and membership/

awareness committee and GL District Lecturer will cross over into the education committee arena where the Craft Warden would find online content for various presentations, educational materials and more from the members login from the education portal.



Honor Flight

From the Grand Commandery of Colorado

Rocky Mountain Honor Flight is a Denver Colorado-based non-profit organization formed in 2007. Our goal is to fly every able and willing Veteran to Washington D.C. to visit the monuments and memorials dedicated to their service. Our priority is

with World War II and terminally ill Veterans. We also accept applications from all Veterans. We are a member of Honor Flight Network, which began this activity in 2005 and began flying with commercial charter aircraft in 2006 from Dayton, Ohio. There are now about 130 "hubs", from which flights originate around the country. National Honor Flight Network provides us with logistical support as well as arranging activities in Washington D.C.

Veterans must fill out an application form, which can be found on our application page https://rockymountainhonorflight.org/ and printed or downloaded. Trained volunteer guardians accompany all Veterans on each flight. Volunteers can apply to be a guardian by downloading or printing the form available here. Various private and commercial donors support us. We are supported by many Veterans' organizations in the region. We have no paid staff. Our volunteers organize the Veterans for travel, arrange the travel both to and from Washington, and arrange all transportation, activities and meals in Washington. The "journey" is usually 3 days and 2 nights, spending several hours at the World War II Memorial, and visiting other Washington landmarks such as the Korean War Memorial, Vietnam Wall, Lincoln Memorial, Arlington

National Cemetery and changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns and the Marine Corps War Memorial.

At the current time, for obvious reasons, priority is given to World War II Veterans. If a Veteran is certified terminally ill by a doctor but able to travel, he or she moves up the priority list no matter what their era of service. We hope to launch at least four flights per year and perhaps more, providing we get enough financial support.



Flags for Fallen Vets is a national program that annually takes place at a number of national, or military cemeteries across the country. 
