MERIT OVER TRADITION

The Imperative of Qualification-Based Leadership in Masonic Lodges

In the esteemed tradition of Masonic Lodges, the selection of leadership embodies a decision that profoundly impacts the future and fidelity to our principles. The question stands: should leadership be conferred based on a brother's qualifications, or does it yield to the



longstanding practice of tenure and the progressive line mentality? The route we select not only sculpts our current fellowship but also has enduring effects on the fraternity's legacy.

Tenure within the Lodge, while indicative of a brother's commitment, does not inherently equate to leadership capability. A brother elevated merely because it is his turn might find difficulty when the demands of leadership call for more than longevity in the fraternity. The progressive line mentality, an echo of bygone hierarchies, often places sequence before skill. Though respect for the progression of ranks is deeply ingrained, it shouldn't eclipse the necessity for skillful leadership.

As Masonic Lodges face an era brimming with complexity, selecting leaders based on their qualifications becomes critical. Leaders should embody the Masonic virtues through



















practical wisdom, a strategic mindset, and the ability to foster growth and resilience within the fraternity. Qualifications mean more than just ritual proficiency; they involve a spectrum of leadership traits including moral fortitude, judicious decision-making, and the ability to unite the brethren under a shared vision.

Emphasizing qualifications reaffirms a meritocratic foundation, signifying that Masonic leadership is a mantle of service, achieved through exemplary conduct and beneficial contributions to the Lodge. It cultivates an environment where every brother is encouraged to aspire, grow, and potentially lead, mirroring the collective excellence of our order.

Authentic connection with the brotherhood remains vital; however, such bonds should be founded on respect for a brother's capabilities and leadership qualities rather than the familiarity of his presence or the expectation of progression.

History has shown us the risks of conferring leadership based solely on tenure or adherence to the progressive line. Lodges that have thrived typically did so under the guidance of those most aptly prepared to confront contemporary challenges, regardless of their tenure or popularity.

Choosing leaders based on qualifications is a deliberate and strategic choice for Masonic Lodges. It ensures that our leaders are the most capable of steering the Lodge through the vicissitudes of time, with leadership being an active duty undertaken with competence, Masonic insight, and a profound dedication to our enduring values. In Masonry, true leadership is not about simply awaiting one's turn; it's about being duly and truly prepared to serve when the Lodge calls.

2024 Matching Grants for Lodge Scholarships

Colorado Masons and their lodges have enjoyed great success with the Matching Grant program for many years. Students from all over Colorado have had financial assistance from their local lodges participating in Matching Grants. The Board of the Benevolent Fund sincerely appreciates the support shown by the lodges and is most pleased to continue the Matching Grant program.

The Matching Grants for 2024 will be up to \$500.00. To qualify for the full \$500 match, the Lodge would need to award an educational grant to a 2024 public high school graduating senior who will attend a Colorado institution of higher education. If the Lodge gives a total of \$1,000.00 or more to their chosen student, the match would be for half that amount, or \$500. If a lodge gives less than \$1,000, the match would be for half of the amount of the lodge grant.

One change in the Matching Grant program is that a lodge can give a scholarship to more than one student in their area and apply for a match for each scholarship granted.

The deadline for requesting the matching grant is June 30, 2024. The form should be returned by email to: education@cmbfa.org, or by snail mail to Scholarship Administrator, PO Box 703, Westminster, CO. If using regular mail, it must be postmarked by June 30, 2024 and received by July 8th. Checks will be distributed to Lodges the end of June or end of July depending on when the request forms are received and logged in.

The Forget-Me-Not Flower Freemasonry in Nazi Germany

The "forget-me-not" is the informal name for the Myosotis flower, known for being small and having blue or purple petals.



From its beginning in 1933, Nazi Germany placed severe legal, political, and civic restrictions against institutions it saw as hostile to, or inconsistent with, its aims and ideals. Along with Jews, members of the LGBTQ+ community, those with mental and physical handicaps, Catholics, and Jehovah's Witnesses, Freemasons were likewise targeted for criminal prosecution and exclusion from society. The Enabling Act of 1933 dissolved all Masonic lodges in the Third Reich, confiscating all property and banning members from joining the Nazi Party. Free association between and among Masons un-

der Nazi control was dangerous. There were Brothers, however, who were determined not to give up their identity as Freemasons, even under these most difficult of circumstances.

In 1926, the Grand Lodge Zur Sonne (Grand Lodge of the Sun) held its annual meeting in Bremen in northern Germany. It adopted a blue forget-me-not badge as its emblem, which was produced by a local factory. That was a terrible time in Germany, economically speaking, further aggravated in 1929 following that year's Great Depression. That economic situation, contributed to Hitler's accession to power. Many people depended on charity, some of which was Masonic. Distributing the forget-me-not at the Grand Lodge Communication was meant to remind German Brethren of the charitable activities of the Grand Lodge.

By coincidence, the same facility was called upon to produce a blue forget-me-not lapel pin in 1938 by the National Socialist People's Welfare Organization, to commemorate its Winterhilfswerk, or winter charitable contribution drive. The pin was a gift to donors.

During the ensuing decade of Nazi power a little blue Forget Me Not flower worn in a Brother's lapel served as one method whereby brethren could identify each other in public (although even then it was rarely safe to wear any non-Nazi pin), and in cities and concentration camps (allegedly – this would have been extremely risky) throughout Europe. However, the Forget Me Not was a Nazi pin (although for a different purpose), and while nothing was ever really safe in Nazi Germany, this was slightly more so because of its Nazi affiliation. The Forget Me Not distinguished the lapels of countless brethren who staunchly refused to allow the symbolic Light of Masonry to be completely extinguished. Thus, the blue forget-me-not, ostensibly a symbol of Nazi social policy, became a symbol of Freemasonry – a clandestine badge of membership. For example, at the concentration and later prison camp at Esterwegen, Belgian political prisoners formed the Loge Liberté chérie (Beloved Liberty Lodge) and conducted meetings and ritual in secret from 1943-1944. It is reported that the prisoners employed the Forget me not as a mode of recognition. However, direct evidence of this is scarce, and in a smaller community such as a concentration camp it is likely that Brothers could use other means of recognition to identify one another without assuming the overt risk of a badge on their uniform that was something other than the inverted red triangle (a political prisoner symbol in Nazi camps – the designation for Freemasons by the Nazis). But these Brethren did meet in Lodge, within the walls of a concentration camp! Whether they wore the badge/pin inside the camp is irrelevant, it demonstrates the lengths that Brothers would go to ensure their masonic lives and principles were not eliminated.

After the war, in 1947, when the Grand Lodge of the Sun was reopened, a pin in the shape of a forget-me-not was adopted as an emblem of that first convention by those who survived the Nazi era. It then was also adopted as an official Masonic emblem honoring those brothers who dared to wear the flower openly.

However, is the legend true? Or is it just that, a legend (or a myth – to provide it with more potent staying power). There is scant evidence that the pin, badge or actual flower were worn inside concentration camps (as I alluded to earlier) but there are examples to be found of men wearing the pin during the Nazi reign of terror and the Masonic pogrom. Were there Brothers brave enough to resist Hitler? Yes, and they often paid with their lives. So, to envision Brothers surreptitiously displaying a symbol of Brotherly love to identify one another doesn't stretch the imagination too far as we have examples of this happening under the Nazi watch for all manner of occupations and vocations. And this particular subset of the population were members of a secret society already with clandestine modes of recognition so the likelihood of such activity being practiced is even more plausible. There is no direct evidence that can be found (for *or* against this "myth", by the way) but conversations with aged German Freemasons indicate it to be true. Who's to say? But the message conveyed by the history or legend is the same: Freemasonry is a noble, worthy legacy that we are tasked to uphold, through good times and bad, and one which I endeavor to do so proudly.

Ultimately, Adolf Hitler was unsuccessful in eradicating Freemasonry in Germany and beyond. While countless Brothers were persecuted, arrested and killed, Freemasonry, notwithstanding, has still survived. The Masonic tenets of Brotherly love, relief and truth still ring true today long after the Nazi regime attempted so vigorously to eliminate these values from the world.

Membership Awareness and Retention

Greetings Worshipful Masters, Officers, and Brothers:

As 2024 begins and we look to Freemasonry through the lens of membership, awareness, and retention, I wonder how many of our lodges are actively engaged in membership, awareness, and retention in their lodges and in the local communities?

I would like to hear from the lodge representatives on what they are doing to promote the craft from membership to awareness in their lodges and community at large. What are the various ways that you maintain the members' awareness and interest of the craft? What local programs do you have in place to expand your membership locally?

One program for consideration for 2024 is the creation of a Craft Warden position or appointee and I bet that some of the lodges already have a similar position in place, but I would also like to know if that is the case for those that do and those that do not.

The concept of the Craft Warden would be to address the above membership and awareness activities inside the individual lodges and build an interface between the lodges and membership & awareness and the GL district lecturer. The Craft Warden would be responsible for local membership & awareness activities for your lodge and allowing for a larger base of ideas and exchange of information between the GL committee and the lodges. The position could encompass things like holding and scheduling local training and presentations for your lodge as educational, awareness, retention type material, candidate open houses or even scheduling digital meetings based on approved content and format as an open meeting.

A coordinator for any and all membership and awareness, and retention for the members and prospects for your lodge and local area but focusing on membership and awareness. By nature, the responsibilities of the Craft Warden and membership/

awareness committee and GL District Lecturer will cross over into the education committee arena where the Craft Warden would find online content for various presentations, educational materials and more from the members login from the education portal.



From I-76 use Exit 92, Turn right onto HWY 6 for about a mile and then left on HWY 34, go about 18 miles on HWY 34 east, look for an old feedlot on the North side of the road. Turn North on County Road Y, it is about 4.5 miles to the P / Lazy E Ranch. Turn West into the ranch.

> From Akron and Points East

Proceed West on HWY 34 four miles to the old feedlet on the North side of the highway. Turn right onto County Road Y and then 4.5 miles to the Ranch.

> From Sterling and Points North

Take the Atwood Exit from I-76 and proceed South on HWY 63 for about 15 miles. Turn West on Road 50. It's about 4 miles to Road Y, then proceed South about 4 more miles to the Ranch.

Blue Lodge Recognition Nite @ the Denver Consistory Monday—June 17th, 2024

Honor Flight

From the Grand Commandery of Colorado

Rocky Mountain Honor Flight is a Denver Colorado-based non-profit organization formed in 2007. Our goal is to fly every able and willing Veteran to Washington D.C. to visit the monuments and memorials dedicated to their service. Our priority is

with World War II and terminally ill Veterans. We also accept applications from all Veterans. We are a member of Honor Flight Network, which began this activity in 2005 and began flying with commercial charter aircraft in 2006 from Dayton, Ohio. There are now about 130 "hubs", from which flights originate around the country. National Honor Flight Network provides us with logistical support as well as arranging activities in Washington D.C.

Veterans must fill out an application form, which can be found on our application page https://rockymountainhonorflight.org/ and printed or downloaded. Trained volunteer guardians accompany all Veterans on each flight. Volunteers can apply to be a guardian by downloading or printing the form available here. Various private and commercial donors support us. We are supported by many Veterans' organizations in the region. We have no paid staff. Our volunteers organize the Veterans for travel, arrange the travel both to and from Washington, and arrange all transportation, activities and meals in Washington. The "journey" is usually 3 days and 2 nights, spending several hours at the World War II Memorial, and visiting other Washington landmarks such as the Korean War Memorial, Vietnam Wall, Lincoln Memorial, Arlington

National Cemetery and changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns and the Marine Corps War Memorial.

At the current time, for obvious reasons, priority is given to World War II Veterans. If a Veteran is certified terminally ill by a doctor but able to travel, he or she moves up the priority list no matter what their era of service. We hope to launch at least four flights per year and perhaps more, providing we get enough financial support.




